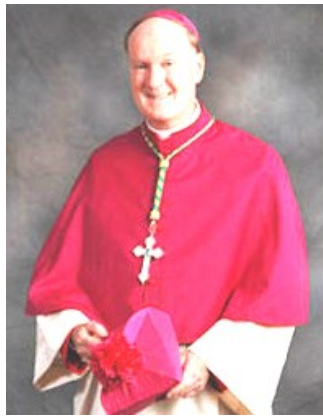


THE CATECHIST CONVOCATION CELEBRATES TWENTY-NINE YEARS!

The Catechist Convocation is an annual faith formation event cosponsored by the Office for Catechetical Formation and the Archdiocesan Association of Parish Directors, Coordinators, and Administrators of Religious Education (PD/C/ARE). What is the Catechist Convocation? In the early 1980's, a group of Parish Directors of Religious Education created a grass roots venue known as the "Catechist Showcase." Using a parish site, this event provided an annual opportunity for the most experienced and gifted volunteer catechists to share their practical insights and best practices in teaching the faith to children. In 1989, the "Catechist Showcase" was retitled the "Catechetical Forum" as professional presenters and broader topics were added. The Catechetical Forum was later named the Catechist Convocation as participants included both parish catechists and Catholic school teachers. Though the name has changed over the years, the PD/C/ARE Association keeps true to the original mission of its Catechist Convocation:

The professional and spiritual growth of the parish catechist through a sharing of theological insights, teaching methodologies, and practical applications.

THE MOST REVEREND MICHAEL J. FITZGERALD, PRINCIPAL CELEBRANT AND HOMILIST



Bishop Michael J. Fitzgerald was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese in 1980.

He graduated from Temple University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English in 1970, and earned a Juris Doctor from Villanova University School of Law in 1973. He served as a judicial clerk in the Court of Common Pleas in Montgomery County from 1973 to 1975, and then worked in private practice. He entered St. Charles Borromeo Seminary in 1975. After serving as a parish priest, Bishop Fitzgerald was the defender of the bond (1982-1983), a judge (1983-1987), Judicial Vicar (2007-2010) and was the first director of Archdiocesan Office for Legal Services (1991-2004). He was named a Chaplain of His Holiness in 2003. Bishop Fitzgerald also holds a Licentiate of Canon Law from Catholic University of America, and a Doctor of Canon Law degree from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome.

Bishop Fitzgerald was named an auxiliary bishop of Philadelphia with the oversight of Catholic Education as part of his responsibilities in 2010.

We are honored to have Bishop Fitzgerald as the celebrant of Mass today.

Using this biblical passage as a metaphor for the Mass, this workshop explores ways to energize and inspire this level student to be missionary disciples.

A-8. Come Away and Rest Awhile With Me: The Importance of Eucharistic Adoration

A "holy phenomenon" occurs at "LC" every Thursday night at 7PM. A group of 30-40 students gather (on their own time!) for a Holy Hour and Eucharistic adoration. Come and listen to their faith witness to the beauty and peace that this time with the Lord provides as these young people step away from a world of technology and daily pressures of life. They will also stress the importance of introducing this form of meditative prayer to younger students.

A-9. Saints, Sacraments and Sanctify: Praying with 5th and 6th Grade Students
