Catholic children world-wide are taught, as part of their faith formation, to heed the words of Jesus when he said, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. This year we add one facet to the goal of MCA children in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, and this is to do it WITH JOY! in honor of this year's World Mission Sunday theme: Proclaim It With Joy!

We celebrate World Mission Sunday on October 24th, the theme for this year comes from the Acts of the Apostles 4:20: "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard." This was spoken by John and Peter after healing and preaching in the name of Jesus. They had been threatened by the same Sanhedrin that arranged the arrest and crucifixion of Christ. John would spend the rest of his life sharing the Good News with others. Peter would lead the Church in its difficult early days, until he died for his faith. They gave up everything as our Lord asked. It took them time to grasp what it can mean to be a Christian. Now it is up to us to understand and accept everything our life of faith entails—like a child with total trust in Our Lord.

To be on Mission is to be willing to think as Christ does, to believe with Him that those around us are also my brothers and sisters. May His compassionate love touch our hearts and make us all true Missionary disciples, especially during this Mission Month of October!

#### **October Mission Saints**

#### Saint Paulinus of York


In 601, Paulinus went from Rome to England as a member of the second band of Missionaries sent by Pope Saint Gregory the Great. He was consecrated Bishop on 625 and accompanied the Christian princess from Ethelburga to Northumbria, where she was wed to King Edwin.




Saint Bede tells us that Paulinus was an attractive man, "venerable and awe-inspiring in appearance." He strove mightily to convert King Edwin. The King did stop his practice of worshipping idols, but would not commit to the Christian Faith. He asked his men to weigh in. Bede relates the pivotal speech an unnamed noble made in Edwin's banquet hall. "Human life," the man said, "was like the flight of a sparrow who had entered the hall in the winter night: a brief respite from endless

cold darkness. If, therefore," he concluded, "this new doctrine contains something more certain, it seems justly to deserve to be followed." King Edwin was convinced, and at the following Easter Vigil, he received baptism from Paulinus. This dramatic conversion opened the door for the Bishop. In a few short years, he preached the Gospel all over Northumbria, converting many.

The pagan Mercians attacked Northumbria, and King Edwin fell in battle in 633. Paulinus withdrew from Ethelburga to Rochester, where he served as Bishop until his death. What Paulinius had started in Mission was later revived by the Irish.

#### **Saint John Jones**

John Jones, born in Wales, joined the Franciscans and did his studies in France. At the time, Catholics in England and Wales were being suppressed. John approached the Pope for permission to return home as a Missionary. He made several trips to England, spending his time,

preaching the Gospel in secret.

When chief executioner Richard Topcliffe finally got hold of him, he tortured him cruelly and then put him in prison. There, the "quantity of the good he did was incredible," his contemporary, Father Henry Garnett, testified. Among those reconciled to the Church by John in prison was young John Rigby, who went on to die a martyr. At his trial, John denied that he was guilty of treason.

When it was pointed out to him that he had broken the law forbidding foreign-education priests from being in the country, John replied, "If this be a crime, I must own myself guilty, for I am a priest and came over into England to gain as many souls as I could to Christ." Found guilty, he was ordered to be handed, drawn and quartered. When John was brought to the place of execution, he had to wait for an hour while the hangman looked for a rope. He used the time to preach to the gathered crowd. October 25th is Saint John's Feast day in the company of the other five Welsh Martyrs.

   national office to offer any compensation for
   entries or to return them.

#### **ARTWORK SPECIFICATIONS**

- Artwork must be on an 8.5" x 11" sheet of WHITE paper — no construction or lined paper. White card stock is permissible. Digital copies are permitted)
- The illustration must be depicted HORIZONTALLY.
- Students must illustrate one of the subjects listed under the heading "Subjects."
- Acceptable media includes crayons, pastels, markers, tempera or watercolor paints.
   PLEASE — NO LEAD OR COLOR PENCILS.
- Artwork must be the child's own. Tracings and direct copies of other art cannot be considered. Students selected as finalists will be asked to validate the originality of their artwork.

#### **SUBJECTS**

- The Nativity (a manger scene, Jesus, Mary, Joseph, animals)
- Three Wise Men (presentation of gifts or following the star)
- Shepherds (with sheep, in fields, seeing the angel, or visiting the manger)
- Mother and Child (Mary with her infant son)
- Mary and Joseph traveling to Bethlehem
- Newborn Jesus in manger
- The Angel Gabriel

#### **HELPFUL HINTS**

- Use a lot of eye-catching color. Bolder colors reproduce best. Lightly colored artwork will not show up well if reduced.
- Be careful to erase or cover pencil outlines.
- Do not include text or lettering on the drawing.
- Fill up most of the page, being careful not to let the main parts of the drawing get too close to the edges of the paper.
- Make sure facial features on people and animals are bold (e.g. nose, eyes, lips, etc.) so they will reproduce well.

#### Mission Focus: Sacrifice for Mission Lands with MCA



IN ASIA . . . where more than 5.5 million children receive an education in 16,200 Church-run Schools. Education—in particular for

young girls—in both primary school and in a vocation in sewing, is provided by Sister Catherine William and her fellow Sisters of the Dominican Sisters of Malta in in Pakistan. They also run a hostel for those children in the village from broken homes or who are abandoned. Sister Catherine says. "In the evening, they say the Rosary and read the Bible, reflecting with them on God's great love." Missionary Religious Sisters & Brothers, alike, help provide a better future for children. They need books, desks and lunch to do so. \$100 supplies school materials for many children for a year.



IN EUROPE . . . where permanent Churches need to be built.



After years of persecution and no Religious practices allowed to take place, times have changed and Churches are needed to welcome their rekindled faithful.

\$70 helps to buy lumber.





# IN AFRICA . . . where those who are sick are provide loving care at 6,800 Catholic hospitals and clinics.

Access to healthcare services in rural communities is lacking throughout Africa. Some areas do not have a hospital within 20 miles or more. Health facilities in the Diocese of Onitsha in Nigeria are poor, outdated, understaffed or too expensive, and anyone with financial means actually leaves the country to receive care. Father John Ugobueze has been on a Mission to bring modern healthcare here. His dream is finally taking shape in the form of the Medical Hospital in Okoti-Odekpe, an impoverished area of Anambra. This will provide loving care to those most in need. \$1-a-day/\$30 for a month provides



some Medical treatment.

IN OCEANIA & ISLANDS . . . \$10 feeds ten children a meal each day.

# IN LATIN AMERICA . . . where catechists travel to remote areas to bring the good news of God's love.

In Latin America and world-wide, with Sunday Mass usually only once a month and Mission priests ministering to over 30 or more small Church communities, lay catechists are essential. To form these lay leaders, however, may mean traveling to far distances to attend workshops in small, multi-purpose rooms with no education resources. Help a Mission priest teach his catechist. Help build a small classroom stocked with a few library shelves with books and resources to form community faith leaders. \$40 purchases faith materials.



# IN OCEANIA & ISLANDS... where 3,500 Religious bring the Lord's mercy and peace; working in some 9,500 orphanages.

In the Missions, there has been a tradition that orphans are looked after by extended family. For some, this is not so. Without the Bilong Mipela Haus or "Our Home" in the Islands, the children would have nowhere to go. It is an amazing place that provides for so many children who would otherwise have to fend for themselves. As well as shelter, Catholic Religious throughout the Missions provide children with food, clothes and medical care. They pay their school

fees, they play with them and they are also there to love them.
