

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I know that many worthy charities contact you annually. But in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, our parishes and schools are asked to support in a priority way the Pontifical Mission Societies [The Society for the Propagation of the Faith and Missionary Childhood Association] and Catholic Relief Services' Operation Rice Bowl.

Church documents direct that the Pontifical Mission Societies should be given "first place" [Ad Gentes no. 38] and "the leading role" [Redemptoris Missio no. 84] in the Church's work of missionary formation benefiting the poorest in the world. We need to support that work as best we can. We also need to support Catholic Relief Services [CRS] in the international humanitarian assistance they give to impoverished people overseas.

Knowing this, I ask you to organize your schedules to first accommodate the Pontifical Mission Societies and CRS/Rice Bowl. Parish weekend appeal schedules should follow those established on the Diocesan and Extra-Diocesan Collections list.

Parishes, schools, and religious education programs may elect to support other worthy charities, but this should be in addition to their works of prayer and sacrifice through the Missionary Childhood Association, the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, and CRS/Rice Bowl. I also ask that you carefully research any additional groups you to choose to support to ensure that their work follows Catholic teaching. The Pontifical Mission Societies, given their standing in the Church internationally, are in the position to vet credentials of other Catholic mission relief groups if you require assistance.

Following these guidelines should help better support the universal evangelization efforts of the Church through the Pontifical Mission Societies, and the overseas humanitarian relief efforts of CRS.

I extend my thanks to those parishes, schools and religious education programs that already actively participate in the works of these charities, and am ever grateful for your efforts in forming those your serve in the Catholic Faith.

Father help us to **LEAD** the way to Your love through our Missionary Discipleship. **ALL:** May we inspire others to support the Missions through prayer and sacrifice.




LEADER:

Pauline Jaricot, at a young age, offered and ask others to offer daily Prayer and a Weekly Sacrifice of a sou [about a penny] for the Church's worldwide Missionary work. To begin the New Year and **remember the Missions in a special way**, start to collect pennies or sacrifices for children in the Missions. For each penny you gather, mark one of the pennies on the World Mission Rosary. There are 60 beads on a Rosary, **just 60 cents**, can help **provide milk for lunch for a week a child in the Missions!**

January Mission Saint Spotlight

Blessed Pauline Jaricot: Foundress of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith

Early in the 19th century, a 17-year old young French girl, Pauline Jaricot, inspired by letters about the Missions from her brother, starts gathering together small groups — mostly workers in her family's silk factory. She asked each member of the group to offer daily prayer and a weekly sacrifice of a sou (*about a penny*) for the Church's worldwide Missionary work. Pauline insisted that her efforts be directed to all the Church's Missions, that it be universal.

From Pauline's prayerful efforts came the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith . . . now one of the Pontifical Mission Societies.* The very first collection in 1822 supported the vast new Diocese of Louisiana, which then extended from the Florida Keys to Canada, as well as the Missions of Kentucky & China. Philadelphia was a part of this Diocese. So in essence our "Mission" Diocese at the time, received some of the first donations from the Pontifical Mission Societies.



The *Societies* office for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia has been in existence since 1911 *celebrating 109 years!*

The United States continued to receive funds until 1908, when we became Mission independent.

The **Societies** continue to seek prayer and sacrifice for the world's Missions, now some 1,111 Dioceses in Asia, Africa, the Pacific Islands and remote regions of Latin America. Help is offered for pastoral and evangelizing programs, for cate-

chists and their work, to build churches and chapels, for the work of Religious Communities in health care and education, and for communication and transportation needs. Today, Pauline's legacy and her quest continues to *"love without measure…without end."*

In 1963, 100 years after her death, Pope John XXIII signed the decree which proclaimed the virtues of Pauline Jaricot, declaring her *"venerable."* The cause for her beatification and canonization continues.

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is on January 13th. This is a day to commemorate the *Baptism of Jesus* in the Jordan River by John the Baptist. It is also a wonderful time to recall our baptismal vows and to celebrate the wonderful gift God has given us.

Jesus' baptism, the baptism's of children around the world, and even our own baptism may look different, but all unite us with God and his entire Church. The power of Baptism urges Christians to proclaim Christ courageously and without reserve. Speaking about the Apostles in a homily at Domus Sanctae Marthae Chapel in Vatican City, Pope Francis said:



"They left their homes, brought with them only a few belongings, going from place to place proclaiming the Word. They carried with them the wealth they had: **the faith!** The wealth that the Lord had given them. They were faithful, baptized just a year or so, but they had the courage to go and proclaim. And people believed them! Their preaching worked miracles."

Yes, the power of Baptism GIVES us COURAGE, but in many Mission areas, where Christians are still being persecuted, it TAKES courage to follow Christ.

Throughout history, there have been many instances where Missionaries were not welcome, or in some cases even attacked because of their faith and their devotion to teaching others about Jesus. *"The Church cannot be merely 'a babysitter who takes care of the child just to get him to sleep." If she were this, hers would be a 'slumbering church.' Whoever knows Jesus has the strength and the courage to proclaim Him. And whoever has received baptism has the strength to walk, to go forward, to evangelize . . . when we do this the Church becomes a mother who generates children' capable of bring Christ to the world." -* Pope Francis.

During the month of January, take the time to thank your parents for bringing you to be baptized!

Begin the Year with a heart that is courageous in helping the Mission of the Church.
