- Read: United States Catholic Catechism for Adults, Chapter 1.
- Reflection: What are you looking for in life? What are your goals and ideals?

LECTURE:

- TRUTH #1: *The Human Person is Created in the Image & Likeness of God.* (Book of Genesis)
 - o Catholic belief: To be created in the image of God means three things for the Catholic: intellect, free will and self-determination.
 - o Catholic belief: To be created in God's likeness: we are destined to be people of love.
 - Reflection: The Catholic faith teaches that life is a journey with the ultimate destination of heaven. As one who teaches & models the faith to your students, give an example of how your life reflects your journey towards God.

• TRUTH #2: The Human Person has a Body that is to be Respected.

- Our body is good; goes against the popular culture from one extreme (cult of the body/glorification of one body over another/objectification) to other (the body as enemy to the soul).
- Reflection: Why is important to understand the Church's teaching of the human body as a teacher of the faith?

• TRUTH #3: The Human Person has a Soul, which is of God and eternal.

- o Pre-Christian understanding (Plato, Aristotle and Socrates) believed that the soul left the body at death and went to an eternal punishment or an eternal reward. Foundation for Catholic belief.
- Reflection: With the image of "God's breath within us" how would you explain the human soul to your students as unique and joined to the body at the time of conception?

• TRUTH #4: *The Human Person is Called to Community.* (Book of Genesis)

- o The human person needs others; depends on others; is fulfilled by others.
- o The individualism and selfishness of our time violate the nature of the human person.
- Reflection: Name some social conditions that influence your students towards isolation or individualism. How does our Catholic faith present a different way of life in community?

• TRUTH #5: The Human Person is Called to be a Moral Being.

- Our human nature "knows" right and wrong; Moral relativism rejects this natural law.
- O Things are not right or wrong because the Church says it; the Church says it because they are right and wrong. Conversion stories tell us that people can change. (St. Augustine, etc.)
- Reflection: When it comes to living a moral life in Christ, why are the lives of the saints important?

• TRUTH #6: The Human Person has a Capacity for Reason & Knowledge- Faith is "Reasonable!".

- o Contemporary Culture defines faith as unreasonable, superstitious; promotes "Emotivism" or acting purely out of emotion.
- O Catholic faith is reasonable; filled with mystery, yes, but mystery is something understandable over time, including eternity.
- Reflection: Why does Fr. Walsh insist that we not only reject but teach against emotivism?

• TRUTH #7: The Human Person as a Steward of Creation. (Book of Genesis)

- o Animals/pets are good; but not people. Act on instinct; people, think!
- o God named humans as the highpoint of creation; are "stewards" of creation- care and concern for earth and all creatures.
- Reflection: How does the Catholic perspective of stewardship for the earth differ from a secular viewpoint?
- TRUTH #8: Our Destiny in Glory/We are Meant for Glory.
