Dear Principals and Directors of Religious Education,

I know that many worthy charities seek your support each year by asking that you share information with your school and PREP families.

In the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, our parishes and schools are asked to support our Catholic Charities Appeal (CCA). It's the single largest fundraiser in our local Church and it supports a broad array of ministries aimed at assisting the most in need and vulnerable in our midst. One of CCA's beneficiaries is the Pontifical Mission Societies, composed of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith the Missionary Childhood Association. Church documents direct that the Pontifical Mission Societies should be given "first place" [Ad Gentes no. 38] and "the leading role" [Redemptoris Missio no. 84] in the Church's work of missionary formation through their material support, benefiting the poorest in the world. Those of us with the means to do so should support that work as best we can.

In this light, I ask that you give special attention to appeal materials that support the work of the Pontifical Mission Societies. Parish weekend appeal schedules should follow those established on the Diocesan and Extra-Diocesan Collections list where dedicated weekends are allocated to garner support for this missionary work.

Parishes, schools and religious education programs may elect to support other worthy charities, but this should be in addition to their works of prayer and sacrifice through the Missionary Childhood Association, one of the Pontifical Mission Societies.

Following these guidelines should help better support the universal evangelization efforts of the Church through the Pontifical Mission Societies.

I extend my thanks to those parishes, schools and religious education programs that already actively participate in the works of these charities, and am ever grateful for your efforts in forming those your serve in the Catholic Faith. Please be assured of my prayers for you and your intentions.

## FOR THE YOUTH, SECONDARY & HIGH SCHOOL AGE STUDENTS:

- †Encourage your student groups to include a Missionary prayer or reflection in everyone of their meetings together. Adding the Pope's Monthly Prayer intention [Septembers is below and they are printed each month in our resource] is one easy way to do this or go to our Missions website for different types of Mission-oriented prayers. For variety, can also prepare a brief reflection on a happening in one of the five Mission continents in the world. Inspiration can be taken from Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen's World Mission Rosary or ask Ali Holden at our office.
- †Start your morning announcements with the **Holy Father's Prayer Intention**.

  September's Prayer Intention is: We pray for an environmentally sustainable lifestyle in your daily communal prayer: We pray that we all will make courageous choices for a simple and environmentally sustainable lifestyle, rejoicing in our young people who are resolutely committed to this. In response to the Holy Father's Prayer intention for this month, look on our website to find how Missionaries and the people they serve are making a difference.
- † It is always a great opportunity for High School students to learn about the lives of Missionary Saints and discuss ways in which they were *Missionary* throughout their lifetime. Knowledge of the Saints can hopefully inspire them to one day participate in Mission trips of service in foreign lands that is popular among teens and young adults. The *Pontifical Mission Societies* is also happy to arrange a local Pilgrimage to the shrines of Mission Saints in and around Philadelphia. Contact Ali Holden for more information 215-587-3945.
- † Have your students explore *FIDES* [www.fides.org/English]. *FIDES* is an excellent multi-lingual news source to discover major events that are happening in and affecting the Missions. It has been the official information service of the *Pontifical Mission Societies* since 1927.
- † <u>Fundraising</u> is part of our commitment to be Missionaries. We ask you to invite your students to make a financial offering or plan a fundraiser in response to the presentation. A Prayer-a-Thon, Walka—thon or other—thon is one idea to get started. Students have an opportunity to begin a life-long commitment of giving back to their Church community when they generously give in their high school years.
- † Have a student in month plan and coordinate an annual Mission Mass, World Mission Rosary, sacrificial giving campaign, works of mercy and/or Prayer Service at your school. A Mission group can join together and help.

## **Saint Lioba**

For this month, and this school year's first edition of the MISSION SAINT **SPOTLIGHT** series, we are going way back in time to explore and learn about the life of Saint Lioba. Born in 710, she is most known for her evangelization efforts in Germany and was acclaimed for many miracles: saving a village from fire, saving a town from a terrible storm, protecting the reputation of the nuns in her convent and saving the life of a fellow nun who was gravely ill – all accomplished through prayer.

Saint Lioba, who became a nun and lived in Wessex, England, was a relative of Saint Boniface! When word of Boniface's Missionary efforts among the German peoples reached Lioba's monastery, she wrote to him and offered her prayers and friendship. "I should like to look on you as my brother," she told him, "for I can trust you more than anyone else of my kinfolk."

The two began to correspond. As Boniface's Mission progressed, he began to see a way that Lioba could be a part of it.

Boniface wrote to Lioba's superior, Saint Tetta, to ask her to send Lioba and other nuns to Germany. With that, without a second thought, 30 set off for Germany! After getting established at a Monastery, the nuns were

> to support the Missionary priests with their prayers. But Lioba and those who came with her could not remain hidden and in the background of these evangelization efforts for too long.


The Monastery became a refuge for the Missionaries, as well as, a spiritual center for the people that they served. Lioba, especially vigilant in prayer, and learned in the scriptures, was sought by both men and women, the poor and the rich, for her counsel and spiritual comfort. She further extended her evanglization by founding a number of daughter houses.

Boniface made a last visit to Lioba on his way to his Mission in Holland, where he would ultimately be martyred. Lioba is venerated most widely in Germany, her adopted country that she was devoted her service to.

Statue of Saint Lioba, in this image she is holding a bell. Her mother dreamed before she gave birth of ringing a bell that sounded beautiful church chimes. After telling her nurse, she told her that she would give birth to a daughter that will dedicate her life to the Church.







Fun Fact: Saint Lioba was one of

the few literate Religious Sisters

of her time. This helped her get

far in her evangelization efforts,

and perhaps why she is seen

here holding the Bible!

## MISSION FOCUS: HAITI



Perhaps the most important component of the resource is the Mission Focus page. As we are reminded to pray and sacrifice, we must continue to learn about the many children and communities we help to support.

Pope Francis has called us to unite with the people of Haiti saying, "May the solidarity of all alleviate the consequences of the tragedy!" His plea comes after a strong earthquake shook Haiti August 14 causing countless deaths, wounding many, and causing extensive damage.

Through the *Pontifical Mission Societies* you can help local priests, Religious Sisters and Brothers and lay pastoral workers as they provide support for Haitian communities dealing with challenges that threaten public health and the human spirit. Assistance is urgently needed for children and families, already facing COVID–19, to receive vital services such as food, water, and medicine.



Your donations can facilitate pastoral care to many, as Church workers distribute humanitarian supplies and offer compassionate care. While the *Societies* provide for the many needs listed above in Mission lands, MCA specifically provides support to help children through their prayer and sacrifice.

It is hard to imagine the devastation, of these children, who have been anticipating going back to school to

start a new year, and learn, just as you all were, amidst the pandemic.

Getting back to school this September, you can help children just like you by doing a collection in your classrooms, so we can help the children of Haiti by rebuilding schools, classrooms, replacing damages school supplies like books, chalkboards, desks. Your help is always needed for children in the Missions, but especially now at a time like this!



- Will your students give \$1 each, to replace writing utensils lost in the rubble
- Can your class come up with a fundraising idea to sponsor an entire classroom in Haiti?
- Can your school host a dress down day during the first month of school, to help rebuild a classroom?
